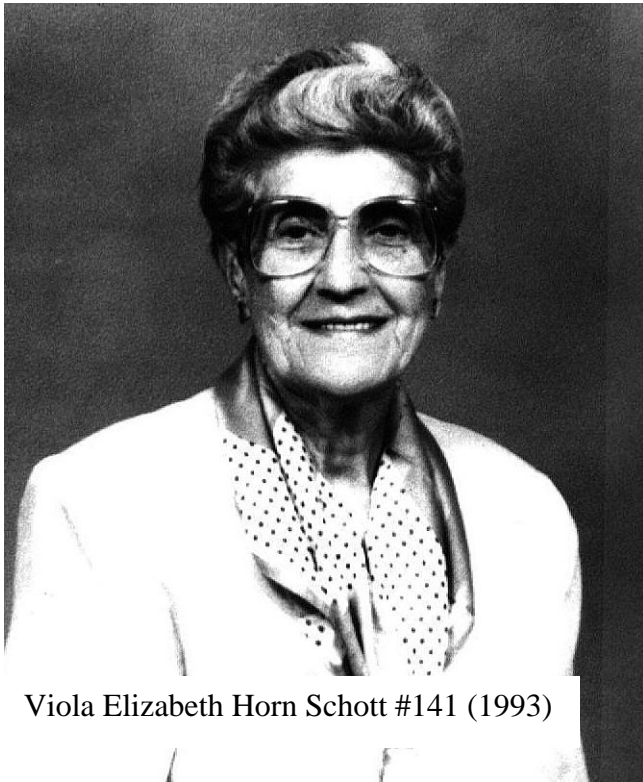

When George Jr. was 12 yrs old he sang on Westford Radio Station. He was billed as a boy soprano. He did very well. When he was a Sr in high school, he had part in the Operetta - H.M.S. Pinafore.

David's graduation night from High School, he went to work in the Lehigh Tunnel where he had a job building the tunnel.

Carol graduated in the top 10% of her class and a member of the National Honor Society.

Dean was chosen as an "All Lehigh Valley" member of the Basketball team - 1st 5.

All of the children had very good singing voices.

Things I Remember when I was very small -

My mother and father took the children to ^{the} ground breaking for the church at 705 Third St (T. Evan). I was given a small coal shovel and told to dig in the ground. The cornerstone date is 1918 so I must have been 4 yrs old.

I also remember bells ringing + whistles blowing and a neighbor lady clapping her hands and saying "The War is Over." I was 4 years at the World War I Armistice.

I also remember either my mother or father taking me up at 251 Lehigh Ave - carrying a kerosene lamp (no electricity) and placing it on a table at the top of the stairs. Probably around the same age. We moved to 134 Lafayette Ave when

we had electricity - across the street from the
Palmerston Hospital.

I have no remembrance of my paternal grandparents
my father's oldest sister Annie - who married and moved out
to the Western states - Minnesota -- Wisconsin (geneology)
My father's sister Eva had a stroke and was in a
wheel chair. Our parents were asked to care for her, but
because my mother was pregnant with Ruth at the time,
the doctor would not allow it. Besides we were four
children and only 3 bedrooms. I don't know who took care of
her. She died at 57 yrs old.

My father's other sister was Miriam who married Webster
Christman - they lived in Leighton and I used to visit
my cousin Edith who was born 10 days after me (Mar 1, 1911)
I liked to visit Aunt Miriam, she was pretty and had a
loving and kind personality. She was an Avon Lady
for many years.

My Aunt Miriam died of a stroke at age 52 old 1932
My father died of a stroke in 1933 - 67 yrs old.

George E. Schott Jr., 57, N.Y. executive and CPA

George E. Schott Jr., 57, a certified public accountant who was managing partner of the New York national office of the Price Waterhouse & Co. accounting firm, died Saturday at his home in Lower Makefield Township.

Mr. Schott was born in Palmerton, Pa., and graduated from Palmerton High School in 1954.

He served as a staff sergeant in the Air Force from 1954 to 1958 and saw duty in Alaska, involved with the Air Force's Early Warning System. He was also a member of the Air Force Band.

After his military duty, Mr. Schott attended Temple University and received a bachelor's degree in accounting, with honors, in 1962. Later, he was awarded his CPA certification.

He had been a resident of Lower Makefield Township for 20 years.

Mr. Schott had been employed by Price Waterhouse for the last 31 years, had been a partner in the firm since

1973 and worked in the Philadelphia office for many years.

"During his time in Philadelphia, he served a variety of clients, handled many difficult technical issues and was known as an expert in the mutual fund industry," said Shaun F. O'Malley, chairman of the board of Price Waterhouse.

Mr. Schott worked in the national office in New York from 1977 to 1979, from 1983 until 1987 and for the last five years was national office managing partner there. He also had served as chairman of the Investment Company Services Group and director of audit quality control.

He also served on the board of directors of the Pennsylvania Economy League's Bucks County chapter, several advisory committees of the Temple University School of Business and the board of trustees of the Kiwanis Club and Foundation in Philadelphia.

Mr. Schott's professional affiliations included membership in the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) and the Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants (PICPA).

"He was a leader in addressing issues of concern to the accounting profession and business community," O'Malley said. "He was involved in numerous [PICPA] activities, including the committee on long-range [continuing professional education] planning and the Spokesman Magazine editorial board. He was a former chairman of the [PICPA] committee on accounting and auditing procedures."

Also an active member of the AICPA, Mr. Schott had served on numerous committees involving investment companies. He also had been an integral part of the group's Securities and Exchange Commission Practice Section peer review committee and continuing professional education standards committee. He was a former chairman of the AICPA's Committee on Intra-State Securities Regulation.

"I worked with George for more than 30 years and greatly admired his considerable professional skills and valued his friendship and advice," O'Malley said.

Mr. Schott was a member of the board of directors of the Avenue of the Americas Association in New York and the Hemisphere Club there. In 1987, he received Temple University's Distinguished Alumni Award.

Mr. Schott was an active member of St. Ignatius Roman Catholic Church in Yardley, served as a fundraiser for its building fund and was actively involved in other philanthropic activities. He was an avid reader, computer buff and gardener.

"He led an exemplary life of virtue and courage and will be dearly missed," said his son, George E. Schott 3d.

In addition to his son, Mr. Schott is survived by his wife of almost 31 years, Alice Kerber Schott; a daughter, Mary Alice Catherine; his mother, Viola Horn Schott; a sister and two brothers.

A funeral service was held yesterday at the FitzGerald-Sommer Funeral Home in Yardley. A Mass of Christian Burial was said at St. Ignatius Church in Yardley. Burial was in Newtown Cemetery in Newtown Township.

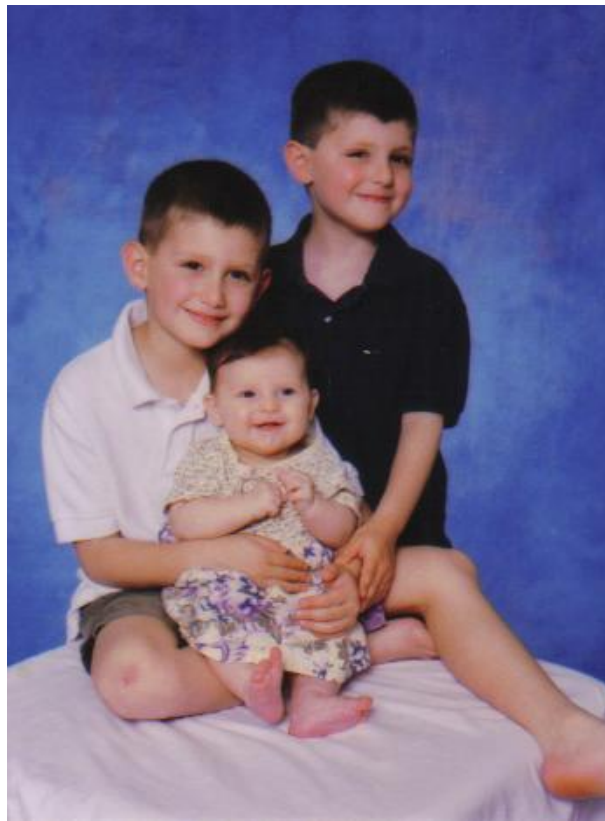
George and I live on the Upper East Side of Manhattan, in a great building. We plan on being in the big apple for at least two years, and then we hope to join the ranks of suburbia.
